



Talking Point Notes The First of the Shabbats

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Hatred of the Jews on the part of the Christian (Catholic) Church from very early times has caused the false translation of, "first day of the week," to be substituted for the actual, literal meaning of the Greek words, μ i $\tilde{\alpha}$ τ $\tilde{\omega}$ ν σ α β β $\dot{\alpha}$ τ ω ν , which is, "one (day) of the Sabbaths." With this, the false idiom was entered into both the Ecclesiastical Greek and the Ecclesiastical Latin languages.

What has it to do with Jew hatred?

- 1. The resurrection would be known to have occurred on the Lord's holy Sabbath Day;
- 2. The practice of counting seven Shabbats to Shavuot (Pentecost) from Pesach (Passover) would have been emphasised in association with the resurrection.
- 3. The fact of the early or primitive Assembly keeping the Torah would have been plainly obvious in other places, such as Acts 20:7.

Those facts would stand in the way of abolishing God's Law, as the Catholic and Protestant Churches have done.

Note also that John 20:1 refutes the theory of a Sabbath afternoon resurrection by the fact that Miryam came to the tomb early while it was yet dark.
